

ELITE HEIFER SALE 14th November, 2020

Top Price: €13,200 / Average Price: €5,302



The year 2020 will be remembered for years to come for obvious reasons, but the Elite Charolais Heifer Sale in Tullamore will also go down in history as one of the best Charolais Society Sales ever witnessed in Ireland, if not the best. Under Level 5 restrictions it was not possible to hold a pre-sale show, instead a pre-sale parade was held on the morning, followed by a viewing period.

The sale that followed saw a phenomenal 92% of the Heifers forward selling to a staggering average of €5,302, which is believed to be a record average at an official Charolais Society Sale in Ireland. Just three Heifers went home unsold, two of which were withdrawn from the ring at €6,400 each. The sale came just a week after a Charolais Cross Heifer sold for €9,000 in Elphin, also believed to be a record price for an in-calf commercial Heifer in Ireland.

Leading the trade at €13,200 was Ballymorrishill Pretty Polly (et), exhibited by new breeders, Paul and Jack Sheridan from Kilcogy in Co. Cavan. This 20 month-old Heifer went to sale with a string of rosettes and championships to her name from her 2019 show season, which included the All Ireland Baby Calf Championship in Elphin. She is a daughter of the Charolais Society bull, Aimable, and an Inverlochy Gurkha bred dam.



Farmer Polly

The Cavan men's success didn't stop there, shortly before Pretty Polly stole the limelight, her herd mate and full sister, Farmer Polly (et), was knocked down at €10,200. It really was a tremendous day for Paul and his son Jack, as they went home with €23,400 for their two 20 month-old Charolais heifers. The two sisters were snapped up by Claire Ferris from Millisle in Co. Down.



Martin Ryan and family from Co. Tipperary also had a remarkable day. Their five offerings sold for an average of €8,760. Topping their trade was Goldstar Portia at €12,200, an 18 month-old daughter of the home bred, Goldstar Ludwig and Goldstar Grace. Portia will now join Harry Heron's Loughriscouse pedigree herd in Northern Ireland.



Hot on her heels at €11,600 was her stable mate, Goldstar Paula (et), a daughter of Goldstar Echo and the aforementioned, Goldstar Grace. This two year-old will now join the well-established Ballym herd in Edenderry, owned by Colm and Louise Quinn.





Next up from the Ryan family at €8,000 was Goldstar Pearle (et), another daughter of Goldstar Echo and this time, Goldstar Nightengale (et). Harry Heron of the Loughriscouse herd in Northern Ireland also added this one to his collection.



Pearle's full sister, Goldstar Prada (et), followed shortly after at €7,400. Having the final call on this 14 month-old Goldstar Echo daughter was Stephen Crampton from Birr in Co. Offaly.



Jon Regan had a worthwhile trip from North Leitrim, after he parted company with his two Heifers for €8,500 and €7,600, respectively. First to go under the hammer was Liscally Pretty Polly1(et) at €8,500, a 20 month-old daughter of the great Domino and

the noted, Maerdy Entry. This classy heifer went North to Co. Tyrone with Peter McCaffrey.


TULLAMORE SALE 7th November, 2020



The Society kicked off their Spring 2021 Bull Sales in Tullamore, and it was the first Breed Society sale of the year. The clearance rate clearly well down from 90% at the coinciding sale in February 2020.



The Premier Charolais Sale 2021 took centre stage in Elphin and the demand for both Charolais bulls and heifers was phenomenal. Despite Covid restrictions and no ringside buyers, bulls and heifers sold to all corners of the Island, from Cork to Antrim, with seven selling across the water to Scotland and Wales.

Overall 79% of the bulls forward sold to an average of \leq 4,493, despite the majority of the 74 bulls catalogued being present on the day. This was followed by an exceptional trade for Charolais heifers, which saw 71% of them sell to an average of \leq 4,808. The words on many peoples lips at the end of the day was 'the best Premier Sale in recent times'.

This came on the back of a great Christmas Cracker Sale in December, and the best sale in the history of the Society, the Elite Charolais Heifer Sale in November, which set a record average for the Charolais breed in Ireland. It is clear that the breed's improvements in recent years in relation to calving ease and key terminal traits are coming home to roost with suckler farmers.







With 109 Charolais bulls catalogued, one would think it was always going to be a buyers-market. However, a smaller number of bulls put forward for sale, accompanied by a solid demand for quality bulls, saw a clearance of 69%, with an average price of €3,807 being achieved. Despite a reduction in suckler cow numbers over recent years, data from the Irish Cattle Breeding Federation shows that Charolais are the only breed that substantially increased in usage from 2019 to 2020. This trend could clearly be seen at this Sale, with suckler and dairy farmers in the marketplace for top end Charolais bulls. The breeds improvements in calving ease and key terminal traits paying dividends.

Stealing the show was the Overall Senior Champion, Ballym Rocco, exhibited by Louise and Colm Quinn from Co. Offaly. This outstanding son of Ballym Mate was a clear favourite from the outset, with judges Mark and Eoin McGovern wasting no time in tapping him out as their pick in the senior section. Born in April 2020, Rocco carries a massive terminal index of €170, a calving figure of 7.4%, and one copy of the Q204X myostatin gene. Having attracted interest from numerous parties, Tom Cox eventually dropped the hammer at €12,800 to Dovea Genetics.

Next best was Jim Geoghegan from Co. Westmeath with Lisnagre Romio (et) selling for €6,800. One of the younger lots on the day at just 14 months old, Romio was awarded the Reserve Junior Championship earlier in the day. He carried a wealth of old French greats in his lineage, with Jupiter, Major, and Hermes featuring prominently. An average sale price of €4,994, which is believed to be the highest ever achieved a Society bull sale in Ireland, and a clearance of 77%, highlighted the phenomenal demand for Charolais bulls on the day. It was positive to see buyers selecting bulls on quality and breeding, as well as indexes. Old favourites were certainly to the fore, with Doonally New and Domino featuring heavily in the high prices. Irish Charolais breeders should really take confidence from the sale, the interest and demand for bulls clearly a sign of thing's to come for Europe's number one beef breed.

It was a dream come through for new breeder David Watts and his family, who were awarded the Overall Junior Championship with their 14 month old bull Garra Rockey (et). To cap off a truly memorable day for the Galway family, Rockey went on to achieve the highest price of the day at €19,000. Rockey is a son of Maerdy Sinndar and the french bred cow, Kilcumreragh Dorothee. He is a full brother to the Bova AI sire, Sagesse Pierre, who was the Overall Male Champion at the 2019 National Charolais Show in Tullamore. After a flurry of online and ringside bids, Tom Cox eventually dropped the hammer at €19,000, the highest price at a Society bull sale for some time. He was purchased by two leading UK herds, the Tweedale herd owned by Jonathan Watson and the Burradon herd owned by Chris Curry, who judged proceeding's earlier in the day.

His father Edelweiss is an outcross for most Irish breeders, combining Unbon and Onde. Leopard is coming eight years old this year and is perfection on his legs and feet. He displays all the characteristics that made Charolais the breed it is today. He has length, width, depth, correctness, softness, with a wonderful kind head.

Leopard has been brought in as an option for pedigree breeders to breed replacement females. His impressive pedigree, outstanding Charolais character, and phenomenal quality make him a must for Charolais breeders here in Ireland. He should be best suited to smaller, fleshier type cows. He is recommended for use on cows only at present, until calves start to hit the ground here in Ireland.

Ocean is a son of Laskari and Homere, making him a complete outcross for most Irish breeders. Ocean was sold as a young bull for €20,650, a record for the station he was sold in. Progeny seen in France are long, stylish, well made, soft, easily fleshed and full of quality. He is breeding a type of cattle that should be easily finished at a young age, ideal for today's commercial market. Ocean should be best suited to bigger, longer, plainer type cows.

Based on progeny seen in France and reports from breeders there, Ocean is a bull with a big future in Ireland. Reports are that he is easily calved and should be suitable for second calved females onwards.

The Inchiquin Charolais Herd was established by my father Patrick, when he purchased a cow Claureen Odesa and a bull Claureen Ugene from Michael Howard in Ennis, Co. Clare.

The following year we purchased two more heifers, Kildaree Trish and Kildaree Triona from my national school teacher Seamus McHugh. These breeding stock were the foundation of the herd.

Other females have been purchased and introduced down the years, the last of which was at the dispersal sale of the Doon Herd belonging to Richard O'Beirne, Doon Lizabelle, and she is breeding exceptionally well.

We keep up on sixty suckler cows, over half of which are pedigree charolais cows.

The bloodlines we have used over the years, just to name a few, are Excellent, Pirate, Doonally New, Indurain, Pinay, Inverlochy Ferdie, Limkiln Bosco, Sagesse Pierre and Fury Action. The focus of the herd is to produce quality stock, keep a constant supply of top-quality females for replacements coming into the herd in order to maintain a high standard of top-quality working cows.

This has to be carefully achieved with the constraints around calving ease and also star

ratings. While keeping a constant eye on these for our breeding policy our preference is to breed according to bloodlines where alot of the old reliable's are very hard to replace.

It's from this involvement with breeding Charolais cattle with my father that lead me to becoming more actively involved in the Charolais society. I was part of the founding members that established the Galway Charolais Club which was started by Joe Clancy, a former council member and also Vice President of the Charolais society and David Tarpey who is our club treasurer. I have fulfilled the role of Secretary of the Galway Club for the past 12 years.

I was newly elected to the National Charolais Council at this year's AGM and went onto to being appointed as the new treasurer of the Charolais Cattle Society. I was honoured to have been considered and elected to the position and on that note would sincerely like to thank everyone who placed their trust in me by voting for me.

I am looking forward to my term on council and plan to stick to the mandate that I was elected upon which is to represent to the best of my ability the interests of Charolais cattle.

Bred by Pat Stephens from Tullow in Co. Carlow, Jupiter has produced some exceptional males and females for the Barker family in recent years.





Tribute to Christy Comerford

It is with great sadness that the Society learnt of the untimely passing of Christy Comerford of the Knockmahon Charolais Pedigree Herd in Castlewarren, Co. Kilkenny in May of this year.

Christy was a current serving member of the Irish Charolais Cattle



In 2019 Christy and his family hosted the World Charolais Technical Congress. Those in attendance described it as an unforgettable night. Anytime you visited Christy and his family you were welcomed by wonderful hospitality, before getting a tour of the tremendous Knockmahon cattle.

Christy's warm personality made him many friends over the years. His love for his family and children shone through every time you met him. His passion for cattle breeding was undeniable. He was a kind-hearted, decent, gentleman, who will be dearly missed by everyone who knew him. His knowledge and input around the Council table will be greatly



The following is a lovely tribute, written in the week of Christy's passing by the Society's former President, Kevin Maguire, a great friend of Christy's.

In a week where the county of Kilkenny lost a hard fought championship battle to close neighbours and arch rivals Wexford, it may have gone unnoticed in some quarters that Kilkenny lost a true legend in his brave battle with illness. Maybe he was not a legend on the hurling field but in his own field of farming and cattle breeding, Christy Comerford will always be remembered with legendary status. With the passing of Christy, Kilkenny, The Irish Charolais Cattle Society, and the wider farming community have lost one of its stalwarts whose contributions to the Charolais breed were both ground-breaking and highly significant. Christy was so passionate about the beef industry that many have described him as the "Michael Collins" of that industry. And just like Collins, his untimely passing has left us all with a deep sense of loss and a trailer load of "What-ifs". Christy was well known in the beef industry, was held in the highest of esteem and has blazed a trail for cattle breeders for many a generation. His absence in the farming world will be sadly missed.

Christy was the salt of the earth who always reckoned he was educated in the University of Hard Knocks but the harder the knock the stronger he became. The first of those hard knocks came when his father passed away suddenly some months before Christy's second birthday. From an early age, he developed a passion for animals culminating in him buying his first Charolais calf at the age of 6. This was the seed that spurred him on to develop the Knockmahon herd which now boasts up to 150 suckling cows and a herd of pedigree Charolais cows, not to mention the 250 ewes.





When we reflect back on Christy's short but very prolific life, let us remember first of all that he was a family man. Christy loved his family, his wife Marguerite, his daughters Cynthia, Colette and Christine and his family loved him. To Christy, family came first and when he attended the Charolais meetings nothing made him happier than taking the opportunity to bring the family along where they could enjoy many a shopping trip, a visit to the swimming pool and even the odd hotel sleep-over. He was a farmer who worked hard, a dreamer who never stopped dreaming, a breadwinner who provided, a devoted husband who loved his wife, a proud father who adored his children and a friend who loved his cup of tea and the craic and of course the odd prank. I can vouch for his pranks when he tried many a time to buy some of my own animals and tried his best to wind me up.

The first time I set eyes on him with his strong Kilkenny accent was in 2006 in Carrick-On-Shannon, four days after his wedding. Many of his fellow competitors were left feeling sorry for ourselves when he cut his honeymoon short to show a bull in the Senior Male's Class and he not only tapped out first prize but later on that day he went on to capture the Overall Male Champion Prize. Since that day, Christy and I have had many the conversation either face to face or on the phone as neither of us embraced the Zoom phenomenon. No week would pass without 3 or 4 conversations discussing family and new farming ideas. Christy was a wealth of knowledge and I absorbed it like a sponge. My only regret now is that I hadn't talked to him for longer because I know the weeks ahead will be a whole lot longer without hearing his Kilkenny accent and his hearty laugh. We became great friends from that time and when the opportunity arose in 2017, I invited him to stand for election to the Irish Charolais Society. Christy accepted the invitation and he was duly elected. His wealth of knowledge and experience of breeding top quality, pedigree and commercial Charolais cattle was not only greatly appreciated by the Society but resulted in his promotion to Vice Chairman after only a one-year stint on the committee. He carried out this role with distinction until March this year. His knowledge of cattle breeding went far beyond most people's comprehension. Christy aimed to both challenge and prove that the Charolais bull could be more versatile and that the breeding possibilities were not negatively set in stone (or in Kilkenny marble). He successfully trialled a Charolais Bull with a herd of Saler heifers, resulting in 24 healthy calves being produced.

Farming was in Christy's blood from a young age and his expertise in the beef world was second to none. He quickly went on to develop one of the finest beef herds in the country. One of the major reasons for his success was his incredible ability to identify bloodlines that would improve his herd. 99% of his bulls were sold at home on his farm and he promoted his bulls by bringing his top quality weanlings to Kilkenny Mart. We all could see the quality of the weanlings that were coming from his tried and tested bulls. Livestock breeders dream of securing a breed championship at one of the many shows that take place around the country. For many, it is the pinnacle of their ambition but Christy achieved this many a time, winning the Overall Weanling Class for no less than 10 consecutive years at Kilkenny Mart. In 2014, he reached the summit by tapping out first in the Senior Female Class before going on to win the Overall Female Champion at the Tullamore Livestock Show. He, himself, described it as winning an Ireland Hurling Medal. He may not have been a hurler but like his fellow county man, the great Brian Cody, he developed many champions and could make the ordinary seem extraordinary. Someone once said you get out of the land what you put into it and Christy definitely did that. He built sheds that could accommodate up to 500 animals yet animal welfare was his top priority. His Knockmahon herd produced top class stock year after year. He supplied top quality bulls to farmers not only in the South East but all over Ireland, to Scotland, Wales and even as far as Australia. In fact, he was looking forward to seeing the progeny coming from a bull he had sent to Australia. Sadly, his untimely passing robbed him of that moment.

Christy liked nothing better that giving guided tours round the herd at Knockmahon. His Home Run came in 2019 when he and his family hosted the World Technical Congress, with delegates from all over the world coming to visit and see his high-quality stock. And when the tour was complete, he put on the party of all parties, the party of a lifetime, hailed far and wide as the Hooley in the Barn. The delegates and neighbours were treated to a night to remember, feasting on his tender Knockmahon steaks and entertained with singing and dancing into the early hours. Is it any wonder delegates still haven't forgotten the Hooley in the Barn?

As Christy said, he was educated at the university of Hard Knocks and just a few short months ago he was hit with the hardest of knocks of all. He bore his burden with great dignity and bravery. His passing was untimely but for Christy it was a happy release given the pain he was suffering. As I drove back from Kilkenny last Wednesday evening, I could not help reflecting on the graveyard earlier when we said farewell to a loyal friend, a friend you could trust and one who always had your back. I reflected on the grown men reduced to tears and I couldn't help thinking of the words of another great Christy when he sang "Crazy World". My thoughts drifted to the thousands of people who passed through Knockmahon and attended his funeral, a testimony to the high esteem that he was held in. Christy was one of our own, a hardworking man who didn't need the comfort of a leather seat and a summer recess to know what's best for the beef industry. Christy was a fun-loving family man, a man of the earth, a man who lit up a room when he entered and who left you feeling better for his banter. His passing leaves an enormous void but we are all the richer for

having known him. His memory will go on and his vision for the beef industry will never die.

Nancy Kraayenhoff once wrote a poem 'Close the Gate' about farming and I believe it is very appropriate way to conclude my tribute to my friend Christy. It reads like this:

For this one farmer the worries are over, lie down and rest your head,

Your time has been and struggles enough, put the tractor in the shed,

Years were not easy, many downright hard, but your faith in God transcended,

Put away your tools and sleep in peace. The fences have all been mended.

You raised a fine family, worked the land well under the hot summer sun,

Hang up your shovel inside the barn; your work on earth is done.

Your labour is done, your home now is heaven; no more must you wait,

Your legacy lives on, your love of the Land, and yes Christy – We will close the gate.

Young Members Association Report


It was great to see young Charolais enthusiasts back on the show scene this year following a quiet two years.


MEET THE WINNERS OF THE 2021 ICCS SUCKLER HERDS COMPETITION

Tom Fitzmaurice – first prize winner – small herd category

Winner of the small herds category of last year's suckler herds competition was Tom Fitzmaurice based in Derrynacong, County Mayo. This herd is the perfect example of what a Charolais stock bull can do as a terminal sire with different cow types. Tom farms on his own and keeps approximately 20 suckler cows. The cows are a mix of Simmental, Limousin and Charolais crosses. They are all run with the herds Charolais stock bull, with all cows calving down in Spring.

Tom Fitzmaurice is well known in his area for producing top quality Charolais weanling's on an annual basis. For the last five years he has sold his Charolais cross weanling bulls at the show and sale in Castlerea Mart. Four out of five of those years Tom has picked up the overall champion of the show, as well as achieving the top price on all four occasions. For anyone who has been to Castlerea Mart for their annual Show and Sale in September, they will understand this is quite an achievement. A real stronghold for top quality Charolais weanlings. The weanling heifers are usually sold off farm to repeat customers. Tom explains 'I have any amount of customers for my Charolais weanlings. The same men have been buying from me for years.'

The stock bulls used on the farm for the last number of years can only be described as real terminal hitters. The current stock bull is Oghamstone Leo, a son of Pirate, out a CF 52 bred dam. Leo was bred by Michael Finnegan in County Mayo. Tom purchased Leo at the 2016 Premier Show and Sale in Elphin for €3,400, when he was just 14 months old. The stock bull prior to this was the well-known AI sire. Tonroe Eminem, a son of CF 52 out of a Pirate bred dam. Eminem was bred by the Callaghan brothers in Swinford, County Mayo. This Pirate/CF 52 combination has obviously worked extremely well on the farm. All replacement females are bought into the herd. Tom points out that he carefully selects only the best replacements for breeding. He explains 'If I see a nice breeding type heifer in the Mart, I will try to buy her.'

Last year Tom's weanling bulls sold for an average of \in 1,152 at an average weight of 390kgs. These weanlings ranged from 7 – 8 months old. His overall champion of the show weighed 445kgs and sold for \in 1,440. The heifers were sold off

farm at an average of €900, at an average weight of 300kgs. The average age of these heifers was just 7 months old. This year's batch of weanling's topped all of that. Once again Tom claimed the Overall Champion of the Show in Castlerea with a 7-month-old Charolais cross weanling bull. He weighed 395kgs and sold for €1,680. His group of weanling bulls weighed 357kgs and averaged €1,340 at just 6 months old.

Not only is this herd producing outstanding weanlings, it's overall efficiency is exceptional. The average calving interval of the herd is 356 days, placing it in the top 10% nationally. The number of calves/cow/year being produced sits at 1.03, placing the herd in the top 5% nationally. The last four cows to be culled within the herd were sold in Castlerea Mart, selling for an average of €1,680 at an average weight of 880kgs.

This herd was selected as the overall winner in the small herd's category as it has just about everything you could possibly want in a suckler herd. The cows provide milk, fertility, calving ability, longevity, low maintenance and cull value. The Charolais stock bull brings calving ease, weight gain, shape, colour, style and quality. The combination of both makes this herd sustainable, efficient and profitable. Congratulations to Tom on creating and managing this wonderful suckler herd.

The quality of the herds in the large category of the ICCS Suckler Herds Competition could only be described as exceptional. The fact that any one of the top five herds could have been in the top three speaks for itself. However, one herd just had that winning edge, that was the herd of Jim and Brian O'Leary from Newmarket on Fergus in County Clare. This herd would stand in with any herd in the country for sheer volume of quality calves and efficiency.

The O'Leary's run a calf to weanling system and keep approximately 120 suckler cows. The breed of cows on the farm are predominantly Limousin, Belgian Blue, Saler and Charolais crosses. In the past these cows would have been first generation cross cows from the dairy herd. However, in recent year's they have moved to all second-generation cross cows from the dairy herd. Brian explains

the reason for this 'the type of the dairy cow has changed and for that reason we needed to move another step away from the first cross to keep the quality in our calves'. The cows are crossed with the herd's two Charolais stock bulls every year. AI is also used within the herd to keep a small number of replacement's coming on. Cows calve down in the Spring and Autumn, mainly to spread out the workload at calving, as Brian also work's off farm.

The two stock bulls used on the farm are two full brothers, Ralahine Oliver and Ralahine Noah, who were both bred by the O'Leary's themselves. They are sired by the well-known AI sire Fiston, out of a Lisnagre Elite bred dam. It is fair to say that both bulls are crossing excellently on the herds various cow types. It is clear to see that they are breeding calves which are easily born and develop rapidly after birth. The O'Leary's aim to breed U grade weanling's and sell most of their weanlings off farm to repeat customers every year. These customers have been putting these weanlings to beef for years with fantastic results.

The quality of the calves on this farm are one thing, but the performance and efficiency of the herd is the real standout. The average calving interval of the herd is 375 days. Mortality at birth is 0%. Mortality at 28 days is 0%. The number of calves/cow/ year is 0.95, compared to the national average of 0.88. The percentage of heifers calved at 22-26 months is 40%, compared to national average of 28%. The herds 6 week spring calving rate is 95%, compared to the national average of 53%. Impressive performance for a herd of this size. Grassland management is also very important to the Clare men, evident in the strip grazing techniques implemented on the farm. The first of this year's Spring born weanlings were sold off farm about three weeks ago to repeat customers. A batch of 7 month old Charolais cross weanling bulls averaged 380kg and sold for an average of €1,200. Their weanling heifer comrades averaged 350kgs and sold for an average of €1150. A younger batch of March born weanling bulls were sold this week at an average weight of 340kgs, at an average price of €1050. One of the most impressive thing's about this herd is the consistency of the calves. They are likes peas in a pod, which is proven in their sale prices.

This herd was selected as the overall winner in the large category for it's sheer volume of quality calves and their performance, but most of all, it was selected for it's overall efficiency and sustainability. What's even more impressive is the fact that the O'Leary's farm on all rented land and continue to turn a healthy profit every year. Quite the achievement for a herd of this size. This herd exemplifies what can be achieved with the correct management techniques, genetics and grassland management. Most of all do, a tremendous example of what Charolais bulls can do on a range of cow types.






Two suckler farmers tell us why they choose Charolais

Not far from Nobber in County Meath, Hubert Hicholson farms in association with his brother Matthew. The pair run approximately 85 suckler cows, 75% of which are Charolais cross. The focus of the Nicholson's is breeding replacement females, with milk and fertility. The cows on the farm are a testament to that breeding policy. Apart from the replacements retained in the herd, all progeny are put to beef. This means as well as producing females with strong maternal qualities, the cattle must also have the ability to gain weight efficiently, grade, weigh, and pay at slaughter. This is where Charolais is key.



Charolais is used in the form of stock bulls and through AI. The current stock bull on the farm is Glera Prince, who is a son of Burradon Tallisman. Prior to this a son of Rancard was used within the herd, who bred exceptionally well, both maternally and terminally. Charolais bulls used in AI are mostly maternal type bulls, such as Voimo, Calogero, Lapon and Elios. Bulls like Tombapik would have been used heavily in the past, leaving some great breeding females with milk. A small percentage of Simmental would also be used through AI.



The herd is entirely Spring calving and boasts some impressive performance figures. Currently the herd has a calving interval of 388 days and weans 0.92 calves/cow year. However, the robust nature of the Charolais cows and their ability to wean heavy calves off grass is most impressive on this farm. Hubert is quick to point out that the calves only get creep for two weeks prior to weaning. "This really cuts down on input costs, especially in today's climate". The fact that many of the weanling's come off their mothers at 50% off their mother's liveweight is proof in itself.



Another important tool Hubert uses is Myosatin testing. The majority of the cows in the herd are Myostatin tested. Because the herd's previous stock bull was a Q204X carrier, many of the



cows in the herd a Q204X carriers. It is for this reason that Hubert only uses bulls that are free off the Q204X gene on these cows. This avoids difficult calving's and heavy birth weights. The herd's current stock bull is free of the Q gene but carries one copy of the F94L gene. Hubert has found this combination to work quite well, with a good balance of maternal and terminal traits coming to the fore.

Some might think that such maternal type cattle would struggle to pay their way as good beef cattle at slaughter. This is far from the case on this farm. Bulls are slaughtered at 20 months off age. The only meal they receive in their lifetime is two weeks before weaning, they are kept on 2 kg/head/day over the first winter, and are fed ad lib for 12 weeks prior to slaughter the following autumn. The results from which speak for themselves. All bull's grade U's, with the last batch of bulls averaging 420kgs deadweight. The standard is much the same across the board on the heifers. They are slaughtered under 30 months of age, with the last group averaging 360kgs deadweight.





It is not too often you come across a suckler enterprise so focused on producing replacement females. The fact that is does not affect the performance of the cattle from a terminal point of view is extremely positive, and proof that maternal type Charolais can perform at the highest level. Efficiency is so important on this farm, simply because it must make financial sense. This farm is proof that maternal Charolais can tick all the boxes if the breeding policy and management is right.

"Charolais Cross Saler – the perfect suckler system"


For years now farmers have been talking about the perfect suckling system. Finding the balance between quality, efficiency, performance, and profitability isn't always easy. One cross that dose seem to be ticking all the boxes is the Charolais Cross Saler. Not far from Borrisokane in County Tipperary, Robert Harding farms full time. He runs approximately 80 Saler cross cows, most of which are crossed with a Charolais stock bull. The results from which are truly outstanding.



Farming on his own, Robert finds it easier to split calving into Spring and Autumn. Bull

calves are sold as weanling's, with the heifers brought to beef. This helps cash flow throughout the year, as well as spreading out the workload for a one-man operation. Robert finds that the Charolais Cross Saler suits his system perfectly. "I can sell my Charolais as weanlings or bring them to beef, that is the beauty of the Charolais as a sire".



Robert first introduced Saler into the herd over 20 years ago. He uses a small percentage of Al and runs a Saler bull to keep replacements coming through. One of the most successful purchases on the farm was the Charolais bull, Knockmahon Master. A son of Harestone Hercules and a Lyonsdemesne Tzar bred cow, Master was bred by the late Christy Comerford from County Kilkenny. Robert describes this bull as the best bull ever used in the herd. Unfortunately, Master got hurt earlier this year and had to be culled. He killed out with a staggering carcass weight of 806kgs and graded a E=. The most recent Charolais bull used on the farm is a son of CF 52.

In May of this year Robert sold his Autumn 2021 born weanling bulls at an average age of 8 months old. The first batch averaged 420 kgs and sold for an average of €1,230. The younger weanling bulls averaged 394kgs and sold for an average of €1,125. It should be noted that these weanling bulls are only fed meal for four weeks prior to sale. The ability of the Charolais weanlings to put on weight off the Saler cows is more than evident. Last February Robert brought Charolais cross heifers to the fatstock show and sale in Portumna Mart, where he received first prize and sold for the top price. The most recent group of Charolais heifers were slaughtered at an average age of 25 months old. They killed out with an average carcass weight of 425kgs and graded a U= on average.

The efficiency of this herd speaks for itself. In 2021 the average calving interval of the herd was 364 days. The number of calves produced per cow was 0.99. Charolais Cross Salers also have one main advantage. Their golden soft hair makes them more attractive in the marketplace. Robert was quick to point out that his weanling's top whatever marts they sell at.

It is refreshing to see an efficient, profitable, and sustainable suckling system in the heartland of Ireland. Charolais as a terminal sire combined with the maternal traits of the Saler cow makes this system a winning combination. More importantly, as a full-time farming operation.



National Hall of Fame Awards 2022

The Irish Charolais Cattle Society proudly nominated the late Joe Gilfillan as their National Hall of Fame recipient earlier this year. Joe Gilfillan had two great passions in life, breeding top quality cattle (pedigree & commercial) and GAA, particularly Roscommon and his local Kilmore Club. Coming from a family known for producing top quality cattle, Joe along with his father, Tom, established the first pedigree Charolais herd in Roscommon in 1974 with the purchase of just one pedigree heifer. At its peak the herd (KILMORE) had 30 top class pedigree cows. Cattle from the herd sold for five figure sums on numerous occasions, two bulls were sold to AI stations, with many others exported to Scotland, Wales & N.I.

Joe's impact on Charolais breeding in Ireland went far beyond his native county. In 1977 he stood for election to the Charolais Council and succeeded on his first attempt. He was re-elected every three years thereafter for the next forty years and was elected as president 3 times.

He was a great ambassador for Irish Charolais, representing the Irish breeders at international events



in Canada, England, Wales, Scotland, France and Brazil. On the home front he was always to the fore as an advocate for suckler farmers organising public events to highlight issues of concern.

Joe was also a great community man. He gave his fields for sports days, community games, and of course, Kilmore GAA. Gilfillan's field was where the reformed GAA club started. Players togged out in Joe's shed alongside the turf and coal. The same field was used for the running of the annual highly regarded Connacht 7 a side tournament. There was no prouder man than Joe when the club won its first Roscommon Senior title in 1983. He was also a founding member of the local community centre which was built in 1989.

Following in his father's footsteps, he served on the Board of the Midland & Western Livestock Improvement Society, where he was twice elected Chairman and was joint Treasurer up until his untimely death. In 1999, he spearheaded the Society's purchase of their extended show grounds.

Joe was (in his own words) a "die hard Charolais man". His passion for and commitment to the Charolais breed was truly admirable.

Charolais International Youth Development Trip to Kansas City, USA,

In July of this year the Society sent two young Irish enthusiasts to the United States to take part in the Charolais International Youth Development Programme. The two were selected based on their knowledge of the breed and stock judging capabilities. After a tough selection process, Eoghan Mc Grenaghan from County Donegal and Aidan Kinahan from County Limerick were the two lucky winners. Read all about their incredible experiences below.

Eoghan Mc Grenaghan tells his story...

Firstly, I would like to start by thanking Nevan, the Irish Charolais Society and the Irish Charolais YMA for giving me this opportunity to represent Ireland at an International level, it was a great privilege and honour, and I will defiantly never forget the trip or experience!

We set off from Dublin on Tuesday the 26th of July on a long-haul flight to Kansas. When we arrived, we were met by Kaitlyn Chism, Manager of the Youth Activities and Foundation of the American Junior Charolais Association (AIJCA) and brought to our hotel. We had a good night's rest and got up in the morning to meet our fellow International Delegates and David Hobbs, Director of Activities for the American International Charolais Association. There were delegates from Canada, Australia, Mexico and Scotland.

On the first day of our trip, we started out by going to Biozyme Incorporated, a business that offers a complete line of high-density feed additives and supplements for a tour of their facilities and a chance to see some of the products being made. Following the tour of Biozymes facilities we then went to Northwest Missouri State University, School of Agriculture Science. Met with farm manager Jim Husz who gave us a tour of their state of the art, centre for innovation and a tour of their farming facilities where they have a herd of pedigree Charolais and Angus cattle. We then made a stop at Wright's Charolais herd where we looked at maiden heifers for sale in their own on farm sale.

Thursday, we met with Dr. Clint Rusk, Executive Vice President of the American International Charolais Association. We visited a WW1 Museum and then travelled to Kansas State University for the AIJCA Charfocus Conference where we were all warmly welcomed by 40 AIJCA members. The conference lasted from Thursday evening until Sunday morning. We had various educational talks and demonstrations on Thursday evening including Animal disease traceability, nutrition talks and livestock evaluating.

Friday morning, we departed the University's Dorms where we stayed for the duration of the conference. We travelled up to Finks Beef Genetics who had various speakers there to speak to us and demonstrate on how to best calf cows, embryo transfer and grading of embryos and on IVF. After Finks brilliant educational sessions, we then travelled to NextGen Cattle C.O, a massive pedigree herd who also run a couple of feedlots. They explained to us about how they operate a pedigree herd, selling bulls to farmers and then buying the weanlings off the same farmers who purchased stock bulls to put into their feedlots for finishing in their own beef packing plants.

Saturday morning was spent at Rock Valley springs. It had all different types of activities such as archery, ziplining, group bonding wall climbs and more. In the afternoon after lunch, we headed on to Tiffany Cattle Co. Feedlots. A massive feedlot company who feeds anything from 10-20,000 cattle at any one time. After the tour of the feedlot, we made our way back to the university where we went bowling for the evening,

On Sunday morning, we had the closing session of the conference, where each of the countries gave a presentation on farming and the Charolais breed in your own country, we then departed the university and travelled back down to the hotel. Overall, the AIJCA Charfocus conference was a brilliant experience and I really enjoyed it.

Sunday afternoon was spent shopping and later that evening we were taken to T-Shotz Golf where we had a brilliant night.

Monday morning, we visited The University of Missouri's Agricultural Experiment Station where they showed us there dairy-beef cross experiments and a tour of there facilities. Afterwards Dr Robert Schnabel gave us a presentation/discussion on Genetics. Afterwards we were taken to Feedes Grain Inc., where they gave us a tour of their feed making plant.



On Tuesday we got a tour of Bayer Agricultural Research and Development Centre, an extensive plant research facility. We then went to the gateway arch national park in St. Louis where we saw the tallest monument in the United States, The gateway arch. Afterwards we went to The Wild Indian Acres herd where we were shown cows and calves and some heifers for their upcoming on farm production sale.

Wednesday, we got a tour of the Springfield marketing Centre where we saw some of the feeder calves auction and got a tour of the facilities. Following the tour of the market, we travelled to two more herds where we saw bulls that was going to sales and some local summer shows.

Thursday, we had an early start and went to the Missouri Prime Beef Packers owned by NextGen Cattle co., who's farm and feedlot we visited a couple days before hand. We toured the facility and got a talk from the operations manager on how the operation works. After the beef packing plant, we went to Joplin Regional Stockyards, a massive market which houses 10 acres of land and sells 600,000+ cattle a year. We then travelled to two more farms where again we got to see more Charolais cattle.

To finish the trip off, on Thursday night we went to a Kansas City Royals Major league baseball game. After the game we headed back to the hotel to relax and to say our goodbyes.

Overall, the whole 10 days were brilliant and was an experience of a lifetime. We made new friends from all over the world and met some incredible people. A special thank you must go to David Hobbs and Kaitlyn Chism for organising everything from hotels to farm visit to meals they couldn't have done a better job. Thank you also to all the breeders and owners of companies who welcomed us to tour their facilities and show us how they run their operations. Another thanks to Nevan also at the Irish Charolais Society for again making this once in a lifetime trip possible for us. Its great to see the Society backing the young people of the breed so much and I will forever be grateful for this opportunity.

Aidan Kinahan tells his story...


Earlier this year, I was lucky enough to be selected alongside Eoghan McGrenaghan to travel to the USA to represent Ireland at the CharFocus International Youth Conference. I first heard about this competition when I began competing in Irish Charolais YMA events a number of years ago and have been anxiously waiting to be old enough to compete for this opportunity ever since. I vividly remember being in work and getting the email to say that I had been selected and trying to ring my parents to tell them.

This trip was my first time travelling without my family and I was both nervous and excited. Despite a last minute change of plans regarding flights, we eventually got going, landing in Kansas City late at night on Tuesday the 26th of July. Upon arriving at Kansas City airport, we were met by the lovely Kaitlyn Chism, Director of Junior Activities and Foundation at the American-International Charolais Association, and Samantha Corn, a student at Texas A&M who was interning at the Charolais Office for the Summer. Wiped from travelling, we made our way to the hotel to bed down for the night.

The next morning, we met the other delegates and began our official trip. There were young people from the UK, Canada, Australia, Mexico as well as Eoghan and I. Although I was initially worried about how we would get along as a group, it wasn't long before we were talking like old friends. Our first trip was to the factory at BioZyme, a company located in St. Joseph, Missouiri. We were given a tour of the facility and got the chance to see the production of their range of supplemented feeds and minerals, learning the different issues they face farming in what is a radically different climate to what we are used to and how they overcome these issues. That same day we got the opportunity to visit the Northwest Missouiri University where we shown around by the herdsman Jim Husz. At this university they run a small Charolais herd and one of their main objectives is to educate young people who have grown up in urban areas about agriculture and food production.



That same day we got the opportunity to visit Wright's Charolais Herd, definitely one of the highlights of the trip. Herdsman Chris Peuster gave us a fantastic tour of the farm and in particular their sale barn and heifers for their renowned sale. At Wright's, we saw their prize winning genetics in full swing, spear headed by their 15 year old stockbull LT Rushmore. Wright's themselves have retained a number of his daughter's, having calved down over 100 of his daughters. There have been 1930 pedigree calves registered from this bull in the USA alone, with many more outside of the US due to the sale of semen. In addition to his pedigree registrations, there is over 12 thousand commercial calves registered from Rushmore. Wright's have opened a farm shop in recent years called Uppercuts in order to showcase the work they are doing and market Charolais beef as a premium product; this business model has been a huge success and shows the value of Charolais cattle to the beef production system.

Day two began with a rip to the American Charolais office and a discussion with Executive Vice President Clint Rusk about the contrast between Charolais in our own parts of the world versus America, and how regardless of the differences Charolais cattle were consistently noted for their profitability and ability to improve all other breeds.



That same day we made a pit stop at the National World War 1 museum, a fantastic facility with a memorial tower that offered a panoramic view of the city. Safe to say we were all suitably impressed!

That night, we made the long roadtrip to Kansas State University for the Vita Ferm Char Focus Youth Conference. There was a huge turn-out of young Charolais breeders from all over the US, including their Junior Board, led by Molly Sloan Smith. The Junior Board was something that stuck out to me personally as a fantastic idea; essentially a Junior version of the main council, the Junior Board is tasked with organising the youth calendar for the Charolais breed, helping with main Charolais shows, and all the while getting the chance to learn about the mechanics of how a breed society operates and learning the skills needed to become the future Senior Board members.

The Youth Conference lasted three and a half days and we were all in awe at the quality of the event. Over the course of the conference we received presentations from some of the leading figures in the US agricultural market, learning about US beef production, grassland, genetics and many other things. For me personally, the highlight of the conference was our time at Fink's show barn. While here, we learned how to AI cows, how to sex calves during foetal scanning, skills needed for embryo transfer, as well as receiving talks on the new technology involved in IVF. We also got to see some of their highly impressive Charolais cows.



Other notable events from the conference included a butchering workshop where we all learned hands on how to break down a Charolais carcase, talks on judging cattle and managing herd health and our team-building trip to Rock Springs Ranch where we had an absolute blast zip lining, practicing archery and sweating like none of us knew was possible! What really stuck with us though was the hospitality we received. Throughout the conference our American counterparts embraced us with open arms and took great pleasure in teaching us about American Charolais cattle and equally looked to learn from us. While at the conference we all gave presentations on how Charolais performed in our countries and the contrast was of great interest to all!

The four days following the end of the conference were an absolute whirlwind. Over the next four days, we saw a half dozen Charolais operations, had talks in two universities, saw a feed lot with thousands of cattle, an Angus AI Station with a record for excellence (Sydenstrucker Angus), had a tour of Bayerthe world's first BioTech company, saw one of the country's largest cattle sale barns, attended Ozark County Fair, a breeding bull wholesaler, a meat processing plant, visited a farm of Aka Ushi Cattle (which we had never even heard of before), called at the St. Louis Arch and saw my first baseball game! It was a crazy few days filled with fantastic memories and even better people. Time and time again I was struck by how welcoming people were and how willing they were to share their knowledge and experience with us.

A big word of thanks must go to Mr David Hobbs for all of this. David spent a lot of time and effort organising a programme of events for us to ensure we were as happy as we were tired by the end of our time in America! He worked tirelessly to keep us on track and keep us all on the straight and narrow – nothing was too much trouble and he managed to put a couple thousand miles up on the van over the course of the two weeks! Rarely have I met someone so passionate about Charolais cattle, a true servant to the breed.

Another thank you to Kaitlyn Chism, who worked alongside David to make this all possible. Kaitlyn had her hands full organising the CharFocus youth conference and still made time to make us all feel welcome and at home and teach us about her role in the Charolais Association.

Finally, to our own Irish Charolais Cattle Society and in particular our YMA. The opportunities this society has given me have genuinely changed my life; the support I was given over the past few years having thrived in their YMA afforded me the means to start my own pedigree Charolais herd last year. The skills I learned, memories I made and the connections I developed with people from all over the globe while on this trip will stay with me forever. I feel incredibly lucky to have had this experience and could not recommend it enough to other young members.



(Registration fee is €60.00 per calf, for breeders who have yet to return their direct debit mandate)

ET Calf Pedigree Registration Fee - €70.00

(ET = Embryo Transplant)

All ET born calves must be either DNA or Geno typed for parentage verified before pedigree registration is complete.

Please note that it is not possible to parentage verify an animal via DNA, unless both parents are also DNA typed and vice versa using Genotyping.

De-Registration

Heifers - Heifers bred in your herd can be de-registered up to 12 months of age and you will receive a refund of €40.00. In order to receive the refund, you must return the herd book certificate, along with a note stating that you wish to de-register the female to the office. Please note that once a female has been de-registered, she can never be re-registered.

Males - Males bred in your herd can be de-registered up to 16 months of age and you will receive a refund of €40.00. In order to receive the refund, you must return the herd book certificate, along with a slaughter docket for the bull and a note stating that you wish to de-register the bull to the office. Please note that you will only receive the refund for males when both the herd book certificate and slaughter docket is received in the office.

Late Registration/Payment Fees

€10.00 per month, per calf, for 1st year €20.00 per month, per calf, for 2nd year €30.00 per month, per calf, for 3rd year

ET Donor Female Registration Fee - €127.00

(Lasts her lifetime)

Registration must be applied for prior to flushing. Application forms and copy of embryo transplant rules will be posted out on request to the office. Donor Cows must be DNA or Geno typed.

DNA Fee - €30.00 per sample (payable direct to Weatherby's DNA laboratory)

Female Transfer Fee - €25.00

Payable on any female purchased outside official Society sales.

Male Transfer Fee - Free of Charge

Embryo Transfer Fee - €25.00

Imported Embryo Transfer Fee – €65.00

Export Certificate Fee - €20.00

Re-printing of Certificates - €10.00

IMPORTED ANIMALS

To be eligible for pedigree registration an Export Certificate for the imported animal(s), and/or embryos, issued by the Herd Book of the exporting country must be forwarded to the office.

The registration fee payable for an imported animal or embryo (male or female) is €75.00.

All imported animals entering the Society's herd book must be tested for Progressive Ataxia before they can be accepted. The Progressive Ataxia results must be accompanied with the export certificate.



POLLED ANIMALS

All pedigree Charolais calves registered with Polled genetics must be Genotyped before a pedigree cert can be issued for them. This will allow the Society to identify the Polled status of each calf at birth and classify them accordingly. Homozygous polled calves will be classified as (PDP) Pedigree Polled. Heterozygous polled calves will be classified as (PDX) Pedigree Polled Cross. In order to request a genotype kit for animal, you contact ICBF on 023 88 20452.

SHOWS & SALES REGULATIONS

Judges and stewards must be treated with courtesy at all times.

All entries must be properly halter trained.

Vendors must wear a clean white coat or clean white shirt and tie.

All animals must be Genotyped, to their sire and where possible their dam.

Genotyping results must be verified **prior to the closing date**.

All animals being entered into the Society shows/ sales must be genomic tested for sire verification and must be verified prior to the closing date of entries. DNA verification will no longer be accepted. By having all animals genotyped, it will allow the Society to request the Myostatin status for each animal entered in Society sales and include their myostatin status in the sales catalogue.

All bulls must be fit for sale

BVD: Animals offered for sale at all Society run Shows and Sales must be tested and BVD virus free.

All bulls must be fertility tested, within 60 days of the sale date. The Society's rules require that the fertility testing be carried out either by Brendan Regan, John McCabe or your own Vet.

Weight: In order for animals to be eligible for entry into society run shows and sales, all animals must **NOT** have an Average Daily Weight Gain of more than 1.8kgs/day for males and 1.7kgs/day for females from birth to weighing at Society shows and sales, unless the animal has previously been verified by the Society. Birth weight of 60kgs for bulls and 55kgs for females is allowable. Breeders with animals exceeding these weight limits will receive on farm inspections.

Entry Fees:

Show/Sale Entry Fee - €20.00 per animal.

Elite Heifer Show/Sale - €30.00 per animal.

Premier & Christmas Cracker Show/Sale - €50.00 per animal (non-refundable).

Inspections: Animals must pass an inspection for all Society sales and the Inspector's decision is final. For all shows/sales, other than the Christmas Cracker and Premier Shows/Sales, this inspection will take place on arrival at the Mart.

For the Christmas Cracker and Premier Shows/ Sales inspections will be held at various centres around the country. Animals at these inspection centres will be required to have an in-date compliance certificate.

At all sales, random blood testing of animals will take place at inspections.

Testicle Measurements: Testicle measurements must be taken by the vet or Brendan Regan or John McCabe when carrying out the fertility test and recorded on the Vets fertility certificate or on Brendan Regan's and John McCabe's printout. All bulls at Society run Shows and Sales must meet the following minimum criteria for testicle size. Bulls not meeting the minimum criteria will <u>NOT</u> be allowed into any Official Charolais Society Show and Sale.

Age	Minimum Testicle Size
Less than 15 months on day of sale	30cm
Bulls 15 - 18 months on day of sale	31cm
Bulls 18 - 21 months on day of sale	31cm
Bulls 21 months and over on day of sale	33cm

In addition, for the Christmas Cracker, Premier and Elite Heifer Shows and Sales, ALL animals must be;

• Export Tested. Please ensure your vet uploads your test date/status onto the CMMS.

- Test must be in date for a minimum of three working days following the sale.
- You must provide a completed veterinary examination form stating that the animal has no abnormalities, for example mouth is correct i.e. check the dentition is correct and the incisor/ teeth are biting on the upper pad, prior to the sale date. Copy of this certificate stating same must be presented to the inspector on the morning of the sale.
- This form can be downloaded from the "sales" section on our website www.charolais.ie, next to the entry form.
- All bulls must meet the minimum weight for age.

YEAR LETTERS

For calves to be registered as pedigree animals, they must be given a name. Each year that name must begin with a certain year letter.

For all calves born in **2022**, you must use a name beginning with the letter **T**

For all calves born in **2023**, you must use a name beginning with the letter **U**

For all calves born in **2024**, you must use a name beginning with the letter **V**

When registering calves, **<u>do not</u>** include the herd prefix.

CALF INSPECTIONS/CONTROL CHECKS

Rule 10 in the Society's Breeding Programme deals with calf inspections/control checks.

The Society reserves the right to check selected herds. The herd owner will be given 48 hours oral or written notice of the visit by the Inspector. A herd owner with a genuine reason may be allowed an extra 24 hours for the inspection, otherwise the herd owner cannot refuse admission to the Inspector unless in the most exceptional circumstances. If a herd owner refuses to co-operate in allowing an inspection within 5 working days from the date of notification, all calves in the herd under 90 days of age (at the time of the first notification) will not be eligible for entry into any Society run events for life. If any calves are moved out of the herd from the date of notification to the date of inspection, those calves will not be eligible for entry into any Society run events for life. All calves under 90 days of age and their dams must be penned for inspection and

weighing. All cows in the herd must be presented for inspection. The Inspector will take a hair sample from at least one calf and its dam for DNA/Genotype parentage verification during the inspection.

(b) The maximum weight gain permitted for MALE Charolais calves 1 – 90 days old is 2 kg per day along with their birth weight.

The maximum weight gain permitted for FEMALE Charolais calves 1 – 90 days old is 1.75 kg per day along with their birth weight.

(c) Herd owners must notify in writing the society's secretary within 5 working days, of any bull calf born with a 60 kg and over birth weight and any heifer calf born with a 55 kg and over birth weight. If the facility for weighing calves is not available to the herd owner, the society's secretary should still be notified in writing of a 'suspected' heavy birth weight within the said period. Unless such heavier birth weights (or suspected heavy weights) are notified to the society within 5 working days of birth, they will not be taken into account for the purposes of these rules.

(d) Unless notified to the Society within 5 working days of birth, any calf which is found to be exceeding the above weight gains at any time under 90 days of age, that calf will not be eligible for entry into any Society run events for life.

CONTACTING THE OFFICE

When contacting the office in relation to a registration query, please have the **FULL TAG NUMBER** of the animal available or if you are contacting about a payment query, please have your herd number to hand. This greatly helps us to help you.

SEMEN ROYALTY FEE

Please check with your supplier before purchasing the straw. We will endeavour to maintain an up-todate list on the Society's website. The bulls listed below are those on the list as of September 2022.

Royalty fees are payable on all the bulls listed below.

Royalty fees are collected by the Society at the time of pedigree calf registration and passed on to the owner of the bull. The Society charges a small fee to the owner of the bull for this service.

The Society operates this scheme so that a greater number of bulls are available to members at a reasonable cost. If you don't have a calf to register you don't pay the fee.
